PREFACE

In the years after the accreditation in 2004, we have worked harder, in a more concentrated manner. While the appreciation and approval of the NAAC team fortified our determination to scale lofty heights, their fruitful recommendations have helped us in overcoming many shortcomings.

As we submit the self study report of Government College, Ropar, for reaccreditation and re-assessment, we reiterate our pledge to persistently impart quality education to the stakeholders, to enhance and enrich our academic and administrative practices by adopting innovative ideas, implementing new teaching and learning skills and introducing multi dimensional activities for growth.

Ropar, one of the economically backward districts of Punjab, situated at the foothills of Shivalik hills is a place of great archaeological importance and ancient civilization that existed about 5000 years ago. The excavation, of articles at a site near Government College, Ropar, validates this fact. It is also believed that Rig Veda was written on the banks of river Sutlej. A Historic meeting between Maharaja Ranjit Singh and Lord Willam Bentinck, the Governor General of India took place at Ropar on the Bank of Sutlej under a Pipal Tree on 26th October, 1831. Ostensibly, the Governor General met the Maharaja to show to the world that he and the Maharaja were friendly. Various boundary issues were settled between Maharaja Ranjit Singh and the British.

Government College, Ropar, one of the premier institutions of modern Punjab is a legacy of pre independent India days. Late S. Baldev Singh Duma, the first defence minister of free India was the man, whose vision led to the establishment of



this college on 6 June, 1945. The foundation stone of the main block of the college was laid in 1949 and the main building was completed in 1951. Later on, two more buildings were constructed, one each for the Department of Geography and Physical Education. The college, affiliated to Punjabi University Patiala, offers graduate and post graduate courses. It has a spacious library block, an auditorium, lecture theatres, laboratories, classrooms, an open air theatre, a playground, a boys' hostel, Principal and hostel warden's residence and beautifully maintained lawns. As there is no government college in the economically backward area of Ropar so it serves the needs of a large number of pupils from nearby villages and small towns.

In order to develop a systematic procedure for writing the Self Study Report, a six member screening committee was constituted at the very outset. The members of the committee are: Mrs. Seema Saini (coordinator), Mrs. Harjeet Gujral, Mrs. Sukhvinder Kaur Maakhni, Dr. Pooja Garg, Mrs. Arvinder Kaur and Mr. Jatinder Kumar. Under the able guidance of Mrs. Savita Sharma, the steering committee coordinated with all the teaching, administrative staff and library staff to collect and collate the necessary information required for the report. Each department held regular meetings with its members to gather inputs about its working, especially with regard to teachers' teaching, evaluation and research practices. The college has been involved in the preparation of its 2nd cycle of re-accreditation for the past one year. The intensive survey necessitated for the self study report has helped the institution to become aware of its strengths and weaknesses and work towards turning them into opportunities for advancement. 1.1Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stake holders. Vision

The vision of the college is to be an outstanding institution of excellence in Higher Education. The college motto 'Will to Seek' inspires us to provide inclusive education for inculcating human values, professionalism and scientific temper. We endeavour to promote need, value and career-based programmes to all section of students including scheduled tribes, scheduled castes, other backward communities and religious minorities with special focus to female students. So that, they grow up to be competent human beings in order to meet ever changing needs of the contemporary times.

Mission

Our mission is to provide higher education leading to an enriched holistic and wholesome development of its key stakeholders. We aspire to inculcate in our students a constant yearning for learning coupled with academic rigour and passionate knowledge delivery. Along with academic excellence, students are sensitized to the concerns of the society. We intend to provide ample scope for multifaceted development of local youths irrespective of religion, race, caste, gender. We also endeavour to pursue student-centric learning for self-development and skill



development among students followed by a keen social awareness and responsibilities.

Objectives

The main objective of the institution is to transform the students into well meaning citizens. We aim to provide a comprehensive value based education to our students. We work earnestly to develop the physical, spiritual, intellectual, moral and aesthetic attributes of the students so that they are metamorphosed into intellectually trained, morally upright and socially committed citizens.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The curriculum is developed by the Board of Studies of the affiliating university. The members of the faculty who are nominated to the Board help in the restructuring and development of the syllabus every three years. At the beginning of the academic session, each department holds meetings in which the classes are allocated to the faculty. Each department outlines the syllabus for each term, prepare their academic calendar and notify the students about it. Various departments of the college prepare an action plan of the activities that they intend to carry out during the session. In order to implement the curriculum all departments employ different strategies like holding tests, assignments, presentations, seminars, etc.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the university and/ or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?



Teachers are encouraged to

- attend orientation and refresher courses in order to improve and upgrade their knowledge and skills,
- attend workshops and conferences, publish and present papers for journals and conferences.
- to act as resource persons and subject experts.
- Inter disciplinary Seminars, workshops and extension lectures are organised to effectively translate the curriculum
- Purchase of new books and subscription of journals

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university/ or other statutory agency.

An academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of each session. Before the beginning of each session the type, duration, papers for various classes as well as rules for admission and examination are outlined in the prospectus so that the students may get an idea regarding the same. An assembly is organised at the beginning of each session in which the Principal, senior faculty members and coordinators of various clubs and societies intimate the students about the different academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Tutorial groups are conducted at regular intervals to solve the grievances if any of the students. A regular verbal and written feedback from the students helps in efficient curriculum delivery.



1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industries, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum.

Teachers are involved in research and send their papers to different publications. Teachers on University Bodies participate in formulation/ modification of syllabus. Industry visits to companies like Infosys are organised for the students of BCA and PGDCA. Two members of the faculty underwent training at Infosys campus under Project Genesis initiated by the Punjab govt. and then imparted training to the students as per the industry needs. Eight students were selected by Infosys Ltd. Educational trips to various places like Pushpa Gujral Science City, Central Instrumentation laboratory (CIL), Botanical Garden at Punjab University, Chandigarh, wet lands at Ropar and archaeological museum, Ropar. Extension lectures are organised by the representatives from varied sectors like industries, banks and academic institutions like Ranbaxy, Yes Bank, SBI and NIIT for various programmes being run in the college.

In the recent past when the university introduced the add on courses in the college, the faculty of the concerned departments were instrumental in designing the syllabi of the Instrumentation and Industrial Chemistry



courses, which is upgraded every three years according to the requirement of the specific area.

The institution analyses/ ensures that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation in the following manner:

Preparation of the Academic calendar, preparing teaching plans for each academic term, timely completion of syllabi, conducting class tests for internal assessment in each semester and holding house tests for courses under annual system.

Besides the under graduate courses in the fields of science, arts and commerce as well as Post Graduate courses in English, Punjabi and Political Science, the college is running job oriented courses like PGDCA and BCA. Add on courses (certificate, diploma and advanced diploma) in Spoken English, Industrial Chemistry, Instrumentation and Data Care Management are being run successfully for the last many years.

Vertical mobility: Within and across programmes/courses students from Arts, Science and Commerce streams can opt for post graduation in English, Punjabi, PGDCA etc.

Horizontal mobility: Students have the opportunity to change their elective subjects even after their admission, though within a stipulated period of time, with due permission from their respective teachers.

Enrichment courses: Add on courses contribute in enhancing the skills. Most of the students opt for higher studies within the college and in other educational institutions after completing their graduation.



- In 2010-11, **Project Genesis** another programme of Punjab Govt. in collaboration with Infosys provided training to two faculty members who further trained the students for placements in Infosys. 8 students were offered placement letters by Infosys.
- In 2011-12, **P-Step programme** initiated by the Punjab Govt. in collaboration with Punjab InfoTech and Industry partner, **IndiaCan** imparted soft skills to the students. Around 80 students were enrolled in this programme and 48 students were offered jobs by industries.
- Another joint venture of Higher Education Deptt. and Punjab InfoTech in collaboration with NASSCOM, Bangalore was a NAC Test administered in 2010,2011,2012. Along with adequate exposure, students with extraordinary scores were promised job opportunities as well.

The Institution has sought sanction/approval from UGC and Concerned University for introducing **B.Voc course in Retail Management & IT and Interior Designing Under UGC 12th plan.** These courses provide academic flexibility, Skill Development and a mean of Employability / Self Employment in the present scenario.

A career guidance cell of the institution is already providing guidance about various career options after graduation.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self finance programmes? If yes list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Yes. The college has a registered body namely Higher Education Institute Society, which runs self financing, courses like BCA and PGDCA. These courses are



different from other programmes with reference to fee and salary structure only. The syllabus for the programme is decided by the university.

The various add on and self financing courses being run in the college provide skills relevant to regional and global employment. The college is running add on courses in Instrumentation, Industrial Chemistry, Data Care Management since 2007



and add on course in Spoken English since 2011. We also started PGDCA in 2008 and BCA in 2009. Number of students who benefited from Add on courses in Instrumentation, Industrial Chemistry, Data Care Management, in spoken English are 887 and 53 respectively.

No. The university does not provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face to face and distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated.

Extension lectures are delivered to the students in order to create awareness on issues of contemporary relevance. Lectures on varied topics of different classes are broadcast via the Edu -Sat programme being run by the Punjab Govt. Seminars and workshops are organised by different departments, societies and clubs of the college to sensitise the students about environment and other contemporary issues which supplement their curricula. Audio visual aids, like PowerPoint presentations, screening of movies, models, charts are used for effective teaching. Students are informed regarding informative write ups in newspapers, magazines and journals. Network resource centre which provides free access to internet helps in updating the



students about the latest development in diverse fields. Various issues relating to the curriculum are discussed during the tutorial meetings. Assignments and projects are assigned to the students to supplement the university curricula. Educational trips are undertaken to various places like Pushpa Gujral Science City, Kapurthala, CIL (Central Instrumentation Laboratory) Botanical Garden at Punjab University, Chandigarh, wet lands at Ropar and Archaeological museum, Ropar, etc. Regular tests are conducted to evaluate the students and feedback is provided to the students. Since our focus always remains on quality education and the holistic development of our students, so they are provided with an atmosphere conducive for their all round personality development. They are encouraged to participate in an array of academic and extra-curricular activities.

In order to motivate the students they are honoured for their academic excellence, cultural, NCC, NSS related activities and sports as well.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organise the curriculum, to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The career counselling and placement cell of the college displays relevant information regarding new placement drives in different sectors and organises various on campus and off campus placement drives. Members of the faculty provide counselling to the students from time to time. NCC unit of the college provides a platform to students for entry to armed forces, police force, etc. Various career oriented add on courses (certificate, diploma and advanced diploma) in Spoken English, Industrial Chemistry, Instrumentation and Data Care Management are being run successfully for the last many years. Various programmes of Punjab Govt. like project genesis, P Step, NAC test were helpful in providing employment



opportunities. Edu-sat lectures on career options telecast by Punjab Govt. help in resolving the students' doubts in regard to their career choices.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum.

The women cell of the Institution plays a crucial role in dealing with the problems of girl students. It organises extension lectures, workshops to sensitise girl students about their rights, strengths and duties. Issues like female foeticide, dowry, sexual abuse and female hygiene are also discussed. Girls are imparted training in Judo and Karate for their self defence.

Environmental Education is a compulsory subject at the undergraduate level. Eco club, NSS wing, Youth services of the college organise rallies, various competitions to mark important days relating to environment and climate change. Lectures are held for the students and faculty to create awareness about Human Rights issues. Cross cutting Issues like drug abuse and AIDS are addressed through rallies and extension lectures. Plays highlighting varied social evils are staged from time to time on the college campus in order to sensitise students.

Chetna Nasha Virodhi lehar, a society set up by some faculty members of the college is playing an effective role in sensitizing students about ill effects of drug abuse and addiction.

For advancement of ICT the college is running BCA and PGDCA courses. Different programmes such as NAC test, P-STEP, Project Genesis of Punjab Govt. were carried out successfully. Classes for the faculty are organised in order to ensure computer literacy.



1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

Guru Gobind Singh Study circle of the college organises moral education examination (Natik Sikhia examination) to ensure moral and ethical values. Guru Gobind Singh Foundation organises camps from time to time to inculcate values in students which are attended whole heartedly by our students.

Career oriented courses are run to inculcate the employability skills. Courses/ Programmes initiated by Punjab Government being run by college have helped the students to be gainfully employed. Extension lectures are organised by the representatives from varied sectors like industries, banks and academic institutions like Ranbaxy, Yes Bank, SBI and NIIT for various programmes being run in the college. The career counselling and placement cell of the college displays relevant information regarding new placement vacancies in different sectors and organises various on campus and off campus placement drives. Members of the faculty provide counselling to the students from time to time. Free access to internet helps in updating the students about the latest Career options. Youth Welfare services wing and NSS wing of the college sends students to youth leadership camps and other events which contribute in their all round growth. NCC cadets of the college are motivated and encouraged to participate in national level camps and Republic day and Independence day parades. Nine cadets of the NCC unit of the college performed security duty at Commonwealth Games, New Delhi.

Students of the college along with Guru Gobind Singh Study circle organise Sri Akhand Path Sahib followed by a Langar every year creating community orientation. NCC and NSS Units of the college organise cultural festival for the students of deaf and dumb school, Ropar and participate actively in all the community oriented initiatives of the district administration. Blood donation camps are a regular feature of



the college. Some faculty members award students who have 100% attendance in their classes which motivates in generating a sense of discipline and punctuality.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Taking into account the needs and problems of the area based on feedback from stake holders where the college is located the college introduced various Add On Courses (like Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma in Instrumentation, Industrial chemistry, Data Care management and Spoken English), Self Financing Courses (like BCA and PGDCA) for generating employability options.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The quality of its enrichment programmes is monitored and evaluated by the institution by taking feedback from students and head of departments. IQAC of the college gathers information and acts accordingly.

1.4 Feedback system

1.4.1 What are the Contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

College level departmental meetings are held to monitor the design and development of the curriculum. The views and suggestions made are forwarded to the Board of Studies of the university. Valuable recommendations and suggestions



regarding the prescribed syllabus are communicated to Board of Studies and Faculty of Languages for necessary action from time to time. The Board of Studies make the necessary changes by omitting and including topics.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The college has a mechanism for getting formal/informal feedback from the students. The feedback thus obtained touches the curricular aspects also. Feedback from other stakeholders obtained at formal meetings of the PTA and HEIS is also considered into when affecting changes in the curriculum. The feedback obtained from the stakeholders is discussed at various meeting such as meetings of the college council and departmental meetings. This feedback is conveyed to the university by the college teachers who are members of Board of Studies.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

In keeping pace with the changing job market, the college is well aware of its responsibilities to provide employable education to its students. The rationale behind introducing the subject of Computer Applications in BCA and PGDCA in 2008 is the increasing demands of Computer Literacy in the current and future job markets. Add on courses in Spoken English, Industrial chemistry and Data Care Management and Instrumentation, were introduced in order to exploit the employment potential in the



nearby industries like Thermal plant, Ranbaxy, Scot Edil (pharmaceutical company) etc.

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The College has an efficient and transparent admission process in place. Proper publicity and transparency is ensured in the following ways:

- An admission calendar is prepared in consultation with the respective faculty members and is incorporated in the college prospectus.
- The College Prospectus gives detailed information about all the admission criteria, reservation policy followed in the college, the quantum of fees for various courses and modalities of the admission process.
- Admission form is attached with the prospectus and students are instructed to submit their duly filled admission form in the college office within the stipulated period.
- Various social groups of the city and adjoining areas are acquainted with the admission schedule through college prospectus, and through advertisements in various newspapers.
- College has its own website and desirous students can attain all sort of information regarding admission policy.



• Banners are displayed on the boundary wall of the college and notices on the college notice boards facilitate the students to get the required information regarding the admission process.

The method adopted by the College for admission process ensures transparency in the following manner:

All those students who seek admission to the first year of a degree course have to submit their admission forms with all the required testimonials to the College office by a date specified in the Prospectus. Merit lists are prepared once the forms have been completely scrutinised by the respective admission committees and displayed on the college notice board. Old students of the college, that is those who seek admission in second or third year of a degree course, have to appear before the admission committee with their admission forms on the date of admission. The Admission Committees finalize admissions strictly on the basis of merit and the reservation policy being followed by the college as per the Punjab Government norms.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. The process of admitting the students to various programs / streams is carried out by way of a transparent, well administered mechanism complying with all the norms of the concerned regulatory bodies like Punjabi University, Patiala / DPI Colleges, Chandigarh.



The sole criteria adopted for admission is merit. However, in case of Add-on Courses the students are admitted on first come first served basis.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The minimum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college is as per university norms. The maximum percentage varies from year to year depending upon the performance of the students and marks obtained at 12th / graduate level.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, in the beginning of each academic session, admission committees are constituted and the principal along with the senior members of the faculty review the admission process.

The Co-ordinators of the admission committees with other members check the admission form of the students to avoid any anomaly in the process, thus making the whole admission process completely transparent, streamlined and foolproof.

Being a govt. institution, reservation policy is strictly followed and the students falling under different reservation categories are admitted according to their reservation quotas. In case, the numbers of seats allotted in a particular reservation category are not filled completely, the Principal with the consent of the college council converts those seats into open quota for the benefit of other students.

The proposal of direct deposit of fees in a bank for the coming session i.e. from 2015-16 is under consideration. Apart from this, it was decided that the Career Guidance and Counselling Cell be involved more vigorously to counsel admission seekers so that the student's profile could improve.

2.2 CATERING TO DIVERSE NEEDS OF STUDENTS:

2.2.1. How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Differently abled students are admitted to various courses in the college according to their reservation quota as instructed in govt. policy. There are ramps to facilitate their mobility in the college. Visually challenged students are allowed the facility of writer at the time of their house exams and university exams. Physically challenged students are allotted classrooms on the ground floor only and, if there is more than one physically challenged student in one class, they are allotted the same section. The library staff helps the physically challenged students by issuing books on priority basis.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

No, there is no formal assessment as such. Members of the admission committee guide the students in selecting elective subjects according to their interest, aptitude and capability. Students are allowed to change subjects within a specified period as per rules after a scrutiny by the subject change committee in case they find it difficult to study any subject in humanities.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the Institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge / Remedial / Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc.)



In order to cater to the needs of students from the rural backgrounds and Punjabi and Hindi medium schools, teachers take extra pains to explain the subject to the students in English, Punjabi and Hindi so that they can understand the lectures well. They are encouraged to speak in the class and to read out from their text books in order to improve their language skills. Through various practices such as group discussions, making the students read out from their text books, by giving them snap quizzes, slow learners are identified and every effort is made to give special attention to them. On the basis of the performance in class test and house examinations, the weak students are identified and additional guidance is imparted to them. Special tests are especially conducted for the weak students to bridge the knowledge gap. Teachers are available to the students during college hours.

The following UGC sponsored Add-on-courses are offered by the college:

 Spoken English. 2. Industrial Chemistry. 3. Instrumentation. 4. Data Care Management.

Many enrichment programmes in the form of NSS/NCC, various clubs and societies such as Punjabi Sahit Sabha, Hindi Sahitya Sabha, English Literary Society, eco club, etc. are also working actively.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

In order to sensitize the staff and the students on issues such as gender, inclusion and environment etc., various talks and seminars are organized in the college frequently. The college holds Extension Lectures/Guest Lectures/Declamations/ Debates/Essay Writing Competitions/Poster Making Competitions on these issues.



- The College observes the International Women's Day every year on 8th March and a week is assigned to women empowerment. Renowned scholars are invited to deliver lectures on gender issues and legal and social rights of women. Students are trained in self defence and are encouraged to become economically independent. Women safety and legal literacy clubs have been constituted in order to create awareness among students.
- To sensitize the students and the faculty on environmental issues, Van Mahaotsav is celebrated every year. Students are given plants free of cost to motivate them to keep their surroundings clean, green and pollution-free.
- NSS and Red Cross wings of the college sensitize the students on various issues and motivate them to extend a helping hand to the needy in the form of donating blood etc.
- Environment is a compulsory subject which all the students of the three year Degree Courses have to study.
- The Tutorial Group Meetings often have eve teasing, sexual harassment and environmental pollution as topics for discussion.

2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies the special educational learning needs of the advanced learners by organizing various Class tests / Mock tests / Essay writing competitions and creative writing competitions etc. Selected advanced learners are



imparted valuable guidance and coaching in the teachers' availability timings. Special books of more advanced level are recommended to them.

Similarly, students having good potential for debating and elocution skills are identified and groomed in these areas. Students with exceptional abilities in singing and fine arts/folk arts and photography are groomed by the respective teachers-in-charge of these activities so that not only do their innate talents flourish, they bring laurels to their alma mater also.

Students who excel in curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities, sports etc. are encouraged to go for State and National Level Competitions. They are honoured at various functions organised in college and are provided all kinds of encouragement and motivation.

2.2.6 How does the Institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

- The performance of the students in house tests and monthly tests is a reliable indicator of the academic performance of the students.
- The class teacher also judges the performance of the students by taking into account their participation in the classroom as well during practical classes. Class room interactions, regular class tests, assignments, group discussions and surprise test help in analysing the information.
- The overall behaviour of the students helps the teachers identify weak students who may be on the verge of dropping out. Weak students get extra attention from their teachers. The data available with the Examination Branch



and with the individual teachers about the academic performance of the students is used to provide required support to the weak students.

- Institution takes initiative in helping such students by providing them financial assistance in the form of fee-concession, free books and scholarships under different schemes. In the beginning of each academic session, applications are invited from economically weaker sections of students and financial assistance is provided to them under different heads.
- College tries its level best to adjust the classes of physically challenged students on the ground floor. There are ramps for the convenience of such students. Library staff extends a helping hand to these students by issuing them books on priority basis.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college plans and organizes the teaching, learning and evaluation schedule in the following way:

- In the beginning of each academic session, college time-table is prepared for both under-graduate and post-graduate classes taking into consideration the number of students in each course.
- Frequent meetings are called by the heads of various departments for unitization of the syllabus designed by the university and to frame the teaching strategies for the academic session.
- Group discussion and interactive session are arranged in the classes.



- Oral and written test are organized by all the faculty members at the end of each chapter or unit.
- According to university guidelines, one house test is conducted in each academic session to evaluate the performance of the students.
- Students have to fulfil university's eligibility conditions of 25% marks in aggregate to appear in final examination.
- Highest scorers in all the subjects are awarded and honoured on the annual prize distribution function of the college.
- Students have to fulfil university's eligibility conditions of 25% marks in aggregate to appear in final examination.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

Internal quality assistance cell contributes a lot in improving the teaching learning quality of the institute thus enabling it to achieve academic excellence. Taking into consideration fast changing global scenario in the field of education, innovative teaching-learning methodology is implemented to upgrade the knowledge of the learners. Our institute, under the guidance of DPI Colleges, Chandigarh is running the process of educating students through EDU SAT, high profile education satellite which is specially configured for audio – visual medium. This visual class room learning with two way communication links offers new technology for supporting effective teaching in the college.

All the laboratories of various departments like Physics, Chemistry, Computers, Botany, Zoology, Geography and Home Science etc. are constantly being upgraded with the latest equipments and tools, to supplement theoretical knowledge of the learners with practical skill.



The Principal along with senior members of the faculty ensures the regularity of the classes. Teachers evaluate the learning process of the students through class tests, oral tests, mock tests, assignments and house tests which are organized and evaluated methodically and students are informed about their performance regularly. On the basis of their performance, special remedial classes have been arranged for the weak students, and we propose to continue this practice in future as well.

Students enrich their knowledge and prepare their assignments and questions with the help of books / reference books available in the college library. Library staff organizes orientation programmes for the students to enable them to make proper and right utilization of library resources.

The Institution ensures healthy and ideal learning environment by maintaining proper discipline in the college.

2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

In order to make teaching more student-centric, teachers encourage active participation of the students in class-room interactive sessions. In their attempt to make their lectures highly motivating, they incorporate their lectures with audiovisual aids, smart-board techniques and over-head projectors. Various well-equipped Science, Computer Science, and Home Science laboratories allow the students to explore and experiment innovatively.

Independent learning is developed especially among post-graduate students by encouraging them to prepare their assignments with the help of reference books of selected writers and critics. Teachers, on the other hand upgrade their knowledge by undertaking UGC sponsored refresher courses and orientation courses.



2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Critical thinking and creativity are nurtured through Group Discussions and assignments on topics which involve brain storming. Extension lectures/Guest Lectures and Seminars at which eminent resource persons are invited to interact with the students also nurture creative and critical thinking. We try to develop logical, rational thinking among our students by encouraging them to express their views and ideas in debates and declamation contests organized by the college, so that they can face the future challenges of life boldly. Handouts containing brief introduction to the topic to be studied are given to the PG students so that they can mull over them and come out with creative responses. The practical work involving laboratory experiments helps in fostering a scientific temper. Field work and visits to industries and other institutions also encourage a spirit of enquiry. Various books, magazines and journals available in the college library help in enhancing their logical critical thinking. The annual college magazine and wall magazine section provide an ample opportunity to the students to write articles on different topics of their choices.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty are:



- i) Computer Labs
- ii) E-learning resources.
- iii) A very rich college Library.

In order to make teaching more effective and motivating, college in collaboration with DPI Colleges, Chandigarh has started educating students through EDUSAT. Enlisted members of college faculty were invited to deliver their lectures through EDUSAT.

Use of well-equipped laboratories of science (Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Computer Science, Home Science, Geography, Music) facilitate the students to acquire practical training necessary for their subject.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Different departments organize Expert Lectures/Seminars/Workshops on regular basis which are meant to expose the faculty and the students to advanced level of knowledge and skills. The members of the faculty are also encouraged to attend orientation, refresher courses, seminars, conferences and workshops. In addition to these measures the College students are also occasionally taken to seminars and Expert Lectures conducted by various departments of the Punjabi University/other institutions. Not only do they get an exposure to newer areas of knowledge, they also



get the chance to interact with prominent academicians and artists. Newspapers in all the languages are available in the college library to equip the students with the present scenario of the world around. Books, journals and magazines are a living source to upgrade their knowledge. Keeping in mind the professional growth of teachers and career advancement of students, conferences, guest lectures and workshops are organized from time to time.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

Guidance and Counselling cell of the college organizes various seminars and lectures in which the students are briefed about the placement opportunities and their procedural requirement. Psycho-Social counselling is provided to the students by their tutors who act as their mentors also. The students often approach their teachers for guidance in choosing their careers and for finding ways and means to pursue their career goals. Economically deprived students who are unable to pay their college fee feel free to discuss their financial problems with their teachers who lend a helping hand and enable such students to continue with their studies. Stress management lectures and workshops are conducted for the students. Number of magazines, journals and books are available in college library to acquaint the students with new horizons of knowledge.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?



The institution encourages the faculty to make use of innovative technologies and teaching methods. Teachers supplement their lectures with audio-visual aids, overhead projectors and computers. In order to make their teaching highly effective and student-centric, teachers supplement their lectures with innovative approaches like group discussions, project studies, screening syllabi relevant movies, field studies and inter-active sessions in the classroom. These practices make teaching-learning a participatory activity. Special demo-sessions are arranged.

A Basic Science Training Workshop was organized by computer science department for all the teachers.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The College Library is very rich in printed books, Magazines and Newspapers. The College library is the hub of teaching-learning process. The teachers and the students visit the library/periodical section regularly to augment their knowledge. College teachers often accompany students to the library to help them consult reference books. The teachers and students can borrow books. In addition to this many departments have departmental libraries also from where the students and staff can get the books, they want. In the beginning of each academic session, the librarian holds orientation programmes for the students and acquaints them with library rules as well as library facilities. The library staff extends a helping hand to all the students in searching library resources especially to visually/physically challenged students by getting them books issued on priority basis.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.



No. The institution does not encounter any challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame. Nevertheless, if for some reason, a particular teacher is unable to complete the curriculum, she/he completes it by holding extra classes.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The College monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning in the following way: The College IQAC at its meetings takes stock of several aspects of teaching-learning continuum. The methodology employed to monitor and evaluate the knowledge and skills of the students is through their class room performance, class tests, practicals in the labs, interactive sessions and house examinations. At post graduate level, comprehension of the students is tested through seminars, presentations and assignments. In addition to this, feedback collected through IQAC from the learners enables the institute to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning. All the teachers have to certify before the students disperse for their preparatory holidays antedating university exams that they have covered the entire syllabus. The college takes feed-back from the outgoing students. The college IQAC at its meetings takes stock of several aspects of teaching-learning continuum.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum



The college is a Government Institution and recruitment and retention of regular/permanent teaching faculty is done by the Department of Higher Education, Punjab. The recruitment of the regular staff is made by the State Govt. on the recommendations of the PPSC which follows very strictly the guidelines/norms of UGC/State Govt. However, in case of vacancies against regular posts and for Self-Financed Courses, the College recruits teachers on its own. The college makes best possible efforts to recruit eligible and well qualified candidates on merit basis. Depending upon their work and conduct their services are continued in the next academic session also.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

In order to keep pace with the changing times, the college started BCA, PGDCA. These are self-financed courses which have been started with the approval of the State Government and after proper affiliation from the university. These courses are run by the Higher Education Institute Society (HEIS) of the college. Recruitment of Senior Faculty in these emerging areas and their retention does pose a challenge since the recruitments are made on purely contract basis with fixed salary component. The college, however, makes all out efforts to recruit the best available faculty from the available applicants.



2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

a) Nomination to staff development programmes.

As per the UGC Norms, the college teachers are permitted to attend Orientation/Refresher Course/Development programmes organized by ASCs/other recognized institutions.

b) Faculty Training programmes organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning.

No formal training programmes to empower the faculty in the use of various tools and technologies for improved teaching-learning have been organized by the college. The Heads of the departments provided informal guidance to the newly recruited staff on how to handle the course content and how to involve students in the teaching-learning process. The newly recruited teachers are also given tips about



evaluation of answer sheets. The college organises seminars and expert lectures on cross-cutting issues which help update the knowledge of the teachers. The college computer department provides its expertise in the use of computers and audio-visual aids to the teaching faculty and the office staff.

Teaching learning methods/approaches

The teaching learning methods adopted are:

Teaching plans, models, charts, one to one interactions, blackboard use, summing up of previous day's work etc.

Handling new curriculum

To handle new curriculum, teachers take help of newly introduced text books, reference books as well as the material available on Internet.

Content/knowledge management

A major portion of the prescribed syllabus is covered with the help of text books and reference books recommended by Punjabi University, Patiala. Depending upon the course content, teachers select and add teaching material according to the changed curriculum from reference books, Internet etc.

Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

To widen the domain of learner's knowledge, teachers along with the text books also use projectors, models, videos and movies, arrange visits to prominent



places of learning and organise workshops and seminars which are further strengthened by interactive session in the class rooms.

Assessment

Continuous assessment of the students in Semester classes by conducting tests and presentations and monthly tests/house exams in courses under annual System, participation in other co-curricular, sports and general development are a few parameters on which the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of the students through the duration of the course / programme.

Cross cutting issues

- The Women Cell of the institution works for women empowerment through lectures and workshops, in which they are made aware about Issues like female foeticide, dowry, sexual abuse and sexual harassment ,women rights, duties, female hygiene etc. A three day Workshop for imparting Self Defence Techniques was organised.
- The ECO club along with the NSS and Youth welfare services celebrate Van
 Mahotsav, in which saplings are planted and students are encouraged and are
 made aware about the need to conserve the environment.
- Environmental Education has become an integral part of the syllabus for under graduate classes in which the students are acquainted with comprehensive knowledge about how to care for the environment.
- College also has a Grievance and Redressal Cell which monitors the problems
 of the students. They are encouraged to discuss their problems with their
 teachers in tutorial classes or by putting their complaints in grievance box
 inside the common room or in the library.



- The institution strictly adheres to the concept of 'Anti-Ragging' policy.

 Prominent displays showing anti-ragging guidelines are put up in the college.
- Chetna Nasha Virodhi Lehar/ Manch of the college is playing an active role in making students aware of ill effects of drugs and other addiction. Rallies are taken out by the students in association with NSS, NCC, Youth Welfare services highlighting the ill effects of addiction, Aids etc.

Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

Although the College has not organized any formal programme for training the faculty in the use of Audio Visual Aids/Multimedia, the College computer department faculty often organizes lectures/demonstrations in the use of audio visual aids and multimedia for the benefit of the College teachers from other discipline.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

The policies and systems to recharge the teachers are:



- All teachers who wish to participate / attend seminars / conferences / workshops and are invited as resource persons to other institutions are granted duty leave for this purpose.
- ii) Those teachers who attend Refresher/Orientation Courses are also granted duty leave.
- iii) If a teacher gets a project from the UGC or is selected under the Faculty Improvement Scheme for completing his / her Ph.D., he is granted study leave with the approval of State Govt. as per UGC norms.
- iv) Teachers are encouraged to publish their research papers in Journals and other academic publications, and to act as research supervisors for M.Phil./ Ph.D. research. All these research activities are highlighted in the College Annual Report.
- v) These publications and paper presentation at International/ National/Regional Seminars/Conferences are taken into account for further promotions under the API Score Scheme of the UGC.
- vi) The Seminars / Workshops / Conferences and Extension Lectures organized by the college also help in recharging teachers.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years.

Dr. Suresh Kumar, Associate Professor in Public Administration was honoured by Gemini academy, Haryana by Sri. Rabinder Nath Tagore Award for his contribution in the academic field



Dr. Harjas Kaur, Associate Professor in Music (Vocal), finds a mention in a book named *Kirtani Sikh Bibyian* (ISBN 81-7205-505-6) published by Punjabi university, Patiala .

Faculty have been recipients of awards in other fields like Red Cross and cultural activities also.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The institution has had a mechanism for obtaining feedback on teachers and teaching-learning process from the outgoing students. The college has started collecting feedback on teachers from the students on the format based on NAAC prescribed student's feedback proforma. The feedback thus received is analyzed and efforts are made to take necessary corrective measures. As a govt. institution, there is no official peer-team evaluation mechanism in the college as such. However the annual confidential reports of the faculty members are assessed and processed by the principal and sent to the D.P.I. colleges, Chandigarh for appraisal.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college students are fully informed about the evaluation process by all the teachers. Based on the prescribed curriculum and the marks allotted to different



sections in the paper, the college teachers give details about what is expected from the students by way of answers and how evaluation would be done.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Introduction of Semester System in all the classes which allows for continuous assessment of the students.

- Internal Assessment in semester programmes (continuous assessment).
- Detailed information about the evaluation process is conveyed through college
- prospectus, notices on the notice-boards, tutorial classes and assemblies conducted especially before the commencement of house examinations.
- Subject teachers hold special discussions in their respective classes about the pattern of the question papers and the division of marks according to university pattern. Principal holds special meetings with the staff members to discuss the examination schedule.
- Students' performance is evaluated throughout the academic session through various class tests/oral tests/ and house-examination.
- Parents of the detained students are intimated about their wards' detention so that they can seek the advice of the teachers and Principal.
- Parents of the students securing less than 75% of lectures are also informed about their wards' detention.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?



The college follows the evaluation system of the affiliating university. For continuous evaluation of the students of programmes having semester system, the internal assessment amounting to 20% of the total marks allotted to a paper has specified marks for attendance, project work / assignments / seminars and mid semester tests. The college students are evaluated strictly according to these criteria. The question papers in both the mid-semester exams and house exams for annual programmes are set strictly according to the university exam pattern as laid down in the university syllabi. The College Examination Committee ensures that the university norms are strictly adhered to.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative Evaluation Approaches:

- i) Internal assessment based on regularity, punctuality, assignments and participation in classroom seminars and discussions is an essential component of formative approach.
- ii) Mid-semester exams are conducted. In order to ensure that the students do not lose marks in internal assessment, a third test is arranged for those students, who due to some reason, could not appear in one of the two-mid semester exams.
- iii) There is no internal assessment for programmes under annual system. House Exams are conducted for annual courses in December every year and the students have to score a minimum %age of marks in these exams to fulfill the university conditions for appearing in the final university exams.



iv)Weak students are given another chance to appear in a special test arranged for their benefit.

Summative Evaluation Approaches:

Final University Semester/Annual Exams are conducted for summative evaluation.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc).

The process of granting internal assessment is very rigorous and transparent. Rigour and transparency are ensured in the following manner:

- Both the mid-semester tests are evaluated well before the specified time period. The answer sheets are shown to the students.
- The process of giving assessment marks for attendance is again totally transparent and as laid down by the university.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The college strives that the college passouts, both graduates and post graduates should have sufficient knowledge of the subjects they have studied; they



should be able to make use of what they have learnt in the college. In actual, real life situations, they should be open-minded, have a rational outlook and they should be able to communicate effectively. The entire teaching-learning process is geared towards developing these attributes. The curriculum, pedagogic practices, community oriented programmes and various clubs and societies work for the attainment of these attributes by the students. At the personal level, ceaseless efforts are made by the institution to inculcate good moral and social values in them. The aim of the college thus is to ensure a holistic development of its learners.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The evaluated answer sheets of mid-semester/house exams are shown to all the students in the classroom. The grievances of the students are resolved there and then. Such anomalies are removed to the total satisfaction of the concerned students. At university level, students dissatisfied with their university results can apply for reevaluation to ensure fair evaluation.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

The college vision and mission statements reflect learning outcomes which the college aims at. These are providing quality education to the students to enable them to find employment and to develop their personality to become good citizens. 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Interactive and innovative teaching methods involving greater use of ICT enabled techniques, group discussions, seminars, workshops, campus placement drives, involving maximum number of students in community programmes, providing counselling services for career choices are the strategies geared toward achieving the intended learning outcomes.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

With the view to enhancing the economic relevance of the education being imparted by the college, the following measures have been initiated in the recent years:

The college started new courses such as BCA, PGDCA which offer ample scope for employment opportunities including self-employment. The College Career Guidance and Counselling Cell and the Placement Cell organize lectures/workshops on Career Guidance and Job opportunities for students of various academic streams.

The social relevance aspect of the education being imparted in the College is taken care of by education in humanities and in liberal arts. In addition to this, the community oriented programmes such as NSS, NCC, Youth welfare Club, Red Cross, Eco Club, Chetna Nasha Virodhi Lehar / manch orient the students for playing an active role in reaching out to the society at large and contribute their bit to social upliftment.



2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Performance of the students in monthly tests/mid-semester exams/House Exams, their classroom attendance and their involvement in various activities such as group discussions, presentations and classroom seminars provide the relevant data about the performance of the students. Based on an analysis of this data, slow learners are identified and they are given extra attention in the form of handouts, special tests and remedial coaching. Generally the barriers are inadequate communication skills, incomprehensibility of the reading material/course content, and economically and educationally impoverished backgrounds. These barriers are sought to be removed by encouraging the weak students to speak out/read from their books, by providing easily comprehensible reading material, by explaining to them how to read the course content and make sense of it. Sometimes, special tests are also conducted for them. They are given home tasks also.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The College Principal, the IQAC, the Examination Branch, and the Head of the departments hold meetings to monitor and ensure the achievements of the learning outcomes. The teachers are motivated to go extra mile to address the problems of weak students. In case the learning outcomes are perceived as not up to the expected standards, the College Principal holds meetings with the concerned teachers/teachers



in-charge of various activities and they are motivated to work harder so that the learning outcomes are achieved.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

The institution and individual teachers do use assessment/evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. A few examples are:

- Remedial/Extra Coaching is arranged for slow learners.
- Bright students who score high on evaluation scales are encouraged by giving them prizes and the teachers pay extra attention to their special needs. They are motivated for further improvement in their performance.
- Revision classes are held once the prescribed syllabus is finished.
- Power Point Presentations to sum up a chapter are made and the print outs are given to the students of the PG/Honours School Classes.

- g. Research activities like surveys etc are undertaken.

- i. Well equipped library provides optimum facilities to the students.
- j. Students of B. Com, BCA, B.Sc. and B.A have to submit their assignments/project reports. Students of Department of Geography carry out surveys and write reports based on the surveys.

Dr. Pooja Garg, Assistant Prof., Department of English, delivered a lecture on the topic Communication and Interview Skills for the students of Department of Commerce.

Departments of Botany and Chemistry organized an inter-disciplinary seminar on the topic Recent Strategies in Environmental Protection.

3.3 Research Facilities

Though we do not have an established research centre in the institution, yet we extend research facilities on a small scale to our students. The students can access books in the Library and Computer Science department. Facility of browsing the internet is also provided to the students.

- Students use the internet to prepare their projects, seminars and assignments.
- Different workshops, seminars and guest lectures are conducted in the college which provide an exposure to the students and motivate them to pursue research work after their post-graduation.
- Teachers are granted special duty leave by the college authorities for participating in seminars, workshops and conferences.
- Workshops conducted by various departments like Chemistry, English, Home Science, Mathematics and Punjabi impart practical knowledge.
- Along with theory, compulsory practical periods are allotted as per university guidelines. To check the progress of students, practical exams are conducted from time to time.
- Laptops and Desktop are used by teachers as well as by students of various departments such as Economics, Chemistry, Physics, Geography, Home Science, Mathematics etc.

The institution upgrades the infrastructure from time to time in order to be at par with the emerging global trends in technology.

- The college library is upgraded and new books and journals are purchased from time to time.
- All the laboratories viz. Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Home Science, Computer Science, English language lab are renovated at regular intervals and latest equipment is purchased according to requirement.

Being a government institution, we cannot have any financial transactions with industry or a beneficiary agency.

- Students from the department of Home Science visit schools.
- Students from the department of commerce and computer visit various companies such as Infosys and accountancy firms.
- Students of department of Economics visit market to study the real facts of price change.

Despite the absence of a formal research centre, the library is upgraded from time to time in order to keep the staff and students updated.

- The library has 51655 books which include general books, reference books and text books.

- User education is given to all the newcomers by the librarian e.g. How to use catalogue, locate books, consult reference section etc.
- Open access facility to text books and reference books.
- Departmental book bank facility for needy students.

Extension activities which emphasize community service are an important aspect of our educational policy. The institution promotes institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement that contributes to the overall growth and development by encouraging the students to participate in activities like NSS



(National Service Scheme), NCC (National Cadet Corps), Legal Literacy Club, Youth Services and Youth Red Cross.

- Camps are organized by NSS Units in which lectures are delivered on various topics like health and hygiene, cleanliness, traffic rules, rights of women etc. NSS units undertake activities that create social awareness and generate a sense of responsibility among the students. Each year the volunteers work tirelessly for the betterment and upliftment of people in seven days and one day camps they.
- NCC cadets, apart from attending camps organized by their respective directorates, undertake training which makes them disciplined and self-reliant. An oath is taken to stand against social evils like dowry, female foeticide and domestic violence. Blood donation camps are organised. A visit to, school for the deaf and dumb on NCC day is organised.
- Red Cross Unit in collaboration with the District Red Cross Society/ Rotary Club Ropar, organizes Blood Donation Camps. Various seminars on social evils are also organized.
- The collective participation of the student members of all the aforesaid units is reflected in activities like tree plantation, water conservation and other environment sustenance programmes.
- Legal Literary Club instils social awareness and knowledge about civic rights and responsibilities among the students, particularly rights of women.
- After the college hours, the young sports enthusiasts from the community engage themselves in outdoor sports activities like Football, Basketball, and Athletics etc on the college grounds.
- In addition to the above, the college in an effort to promote social responsibility has formed the following Clubs and Committees which are functional round the clock:

- These activities are recorded in the College Prospectus and college magazine SHIVALIK.
- The Best Volunteer from NSS/NCC unit is awarded Roll of Honour, college colour and cash prizes on the Annual Prize Distribution Day.

The stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution involves views of students, faculty, parents and alumni. The students express their views by dropping their complaints in grievance box installed outside the common room and library to be addressed later by the concerned committee.

- The PTA organizes meetings where the house is open to suggestions as well as proposals by the parents.
- Alumni Association takes care of the proposals extended by the old students for the welfare of their Alma Mater.
- The students can also express their views and opinions in the tutorial meetings held from time to time.

The institution through its extension activities aims to serve the society and to sensitize the students towards their social responsibilities. Some of the extension activities undertaken in the last four years are:

- In case of national calamity, the staff and students contribute to the Prime Minister's Relief Fund.
- To commemorate Army Day, flags are bought by the staff and students. Money thus collected goes to the Welfare fund of the army.
- NSS units of the college work indefatigably throughout the year for creating social awareness and serving the society. The volunteers kindled with the



spirit of social service, work towards creating a better tomorrow for themselves and the coming generations.

Some Activities of NSS

- Lectures are organized by NSS unit for women folk enlightening them about Constitutional Rights of Women, thus empowering the students in the process.
- Information is provided on topics like female foeticide, dowry, gender discrimination etc which makes the students aware and ready to cope up with the realities of life. Lectures are also delivered on topics like health and hygiene, traffic rules, organic farming, sanitation etc.
- Independence Day celebrations and Republic Day celebrations are a regular feature.
- Every year on 20th August, Sadbhavana Diwas , the birthday of late Prime Minister Mr. Rajiv Gandhi is celebrated.
- On Van Mahotsava, the students plant trees on the college campus and also promise to nurture them.
- NSS volunteers undertake Cleanliness Drives on the campus every year.
- Seven day camp is the regular feature of NSS unit of the college.

NCC

NCC programme offers an opportunity to cadets to develop a spirit of comradeship, the concept of selfless service and capacity for leadership. The college has a wing of NCC: Army. Throughout the year, they participate in activities like:

- The Army cadets attend 9 to 10 camps per year which include ATC, CATC, TSC and Pre-Republic Day Parade camp.
- NCC week celebration is organized in the college and deaf and dumb school, Ropar. Rallies against social evils are organised. Poster making competitions are organised on NCC day.



- Guest lectures are delivered on female foeticide, save earth, save water and other significant issues.
- Cadets donate blood during the Blood Donation Camp organized in the college.
- Van Mahotsava is celebrated and trees are planted.
- Ten cadets participated in Republic Day camp, three in TSC and ten in commonwealth games as security officers.
- Cadets give brilliant performances and earn accolades during the camps.
- Cadets participate in Independence day, Republic day functions at district level.

Red Cross

The Red Cross unit of the college very actively and enthusiastically participates/ organizes activities like:

- Every year Blood Donation camp is organized by the Red Cross Society in collaboration with Rotary club, Ropar.
- 14 students were awarded in Youth Red Cross Day celebrations held at Sri Guru Teg Bahadur Khalsa College, Anandpur Sahib, on 24th & 25th Sept, 2014. The function was held to commemorate the Anniversary of Bhai Ghanaiya ji.
- Poster making competitions based on themes like female foeticide, dowry, sexual harassment etc are organized every year. The winners are awarded by eminent personalities who visit the college.
- As part of awareness campaigns, handouts on important topics are distributed to the staff. This information is also disseminated among the students during the tutorials.
- Red Cross tickets are sold as a part of the Fund Raising Scheme.



- Students participate and bag prizes at Red Cross Mela held every year by district administration.
- On 1st Dec. 2011, the club organized a paper reading contest so as to spread awareness amongst the students regarding AIDS to celebrate World AIDS Day.
- On 1st Dec. 2012, poster making competition was organized to mark World AIDS Day.

Budgetary details

- •The NSS units receive Rs. 75,000/- every year which is spent for refreshment of the students during seven days camp.
- •The NCC cadets receive refreshment of Rs. 25/- per parade.
- •Youth Services club received matching grants of Rs 20000 in the year of 2013-14 to organize different programmes for Youth Welfare.

- Women Cell arranges workshops to train the students in arts like Judokarate. It also arranges Lectures on burning topics like Female foeticide, Rights of women etc.
- College organizes lectures on topics like environmental protection, traffic rules etc.
- Each One Support One is a scheme under which alumni of the college are requested to sponsor economically weak students.
- Driving licenses are made with the help of D.T.O., Ropar.
- Workshops on Yoga, Cooking and Art and Craft are organized.
- Voter I-cards are made with the help of district election office, Ropar.

In this way our infrastructure is upgraded and renovated to meet the demands of the students and the introduction of new courses. Throughout the day the time table is strictly followed. The Labs are optimally used for experimentation. The auditorium is used for extra–curricular activities, seminars, workshops, conferences and also for resource generation. Hostel accommodation is extended for students participating in youth festival, NCC activities, other co-curricular activities as well as for residing students during various sports coaching camps and competitions. NCC Camps are organized in the college campus during the vacations for training programmes.



Our future plans include the following proposals:

- Maintenance of the college building
- Construction of more ramps at strategic points for differently abled students and faculty
- Separate Commerce Block.
- Renovation of parking area.
- Construction of Home Science lab.
- Construction of Post graduation block.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of the students with physical disabilities?

Ramps have been constructed to meet the needs of the physically disabled. The college ensures that the classes of disabled students are adjusted on the ground floor.

• Hostel Facility – Accommodation available

The college has a boy's hostel but there are no boarders as most of the students prefer to commute daily from their places. However the premises are used to accommodate the sports persons who come to participate in various tournaments and coaching camps of Punjabi university, Patiala. Recreational facility available to the students is a common room with audio-visual equipments. Constant supply of safe drinking water is ensured for the students.



4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college has a dispensary which provides primary first aid to the students. In case of emergency the nearby civil hospital caters to the health needs of the students and staff. Being Govt. employees all the staff members of the college can get free treatment from the Govt. Hospitals/Dispensaries with provision for reimbursement for Indoor Treatment and the chronic ailments. All the College employees also get a fixed medical allowance of Rs. 500/- per month.

The College has a separate room for IQAC/UGC/RUSA, Women Cell, Career and Counselling Cell and Placement cell, one dispensary, one canteen. The water supply for drinking purposes is from a deep bore well. There are four water coolers for safe drinking water. The multipurpose hall is used for recreational purposes. The College grounds are also used for outdoor functions. The college has an open air theatre.

A special periodical section has also been created in the library. A book bank is functioning in the college library which provides books to the underprivileged students. It is managed by a committee of teachers and library staff. Special help is rendered to students preparing for competitions. Copies of syllabi prescribed by university are available to staff and students for ready reference. Facilities regarding the latest acquisitions, current awareness services, internet facility etc. are extended to the students. The committee actively organises book exhibitions and works towards creating a user friendly environment in the library. The Committee also monitors the staff and students' visitor register.

The institution plan for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities is:

The college plans to install more computers in the college in order to improve computer student ratio. Wi-Fi Connectivity of all the departments is also in the pipeline The college plans to construct smart class rooms. Online admission from session 2015-16 onwards is in the pipeline. Computer facilities are upgraded as and when required.

The institution makes need based purchases keeping in view the needs of the institution to have more computers or to upgrade the existing IT infrastructure or for maintenance purposes; the College has no scarcity of funds for this purpose. The College has been making purchases of computers and computer peripherals out of its own resources such as HEIS funds, UGC Development Grant and UGC Merged Schemes.

The college teaching staff is encouraged to make use of ICT resources such as computers, LCD projectors, for preparing and giving Power Point Presentations. Power Point presentations are used in the classrooms occasionally. Movies are also showcased as per demand of syllabi to supplement the traditional method with ICT



enabled pedagogy. A well equipped computer lab, LCD/OHPs are available to the faculty for computer aided teaching. The faculty of the department of computer science is always available for any need based assistance in the use of ICT.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has an electrician for upkeep and maintenance. All equipments in labs are placed to proper and safe places and the lab technical staff such as SLAs, JLAs and LAs, are responsible for their safety and upkeep. The college has three



gensets to provide electricity in case of power failure. The repair of defective equipments is undertaken on priority basis so that the college work does not suffer in any way. The college has an efficient team for maintenance and repair work of infrastructure facilities and equipments. There is a full-fledged team of SLA'S, JLA'S, gas man, gardeners, watchmen, permanent and temporary squad of peons and sweepers. Regular maintenance of the facilities is undertaken under the supervision of committees. The college hires expert workers on daily basis as per Punjab Government norms.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

Most of the special equipments are required for Science, Home Science, Music and Geography for practical experimentation. Precision equipment such as Ph meter, Conductivity Meter, EMF developed coil, spectrometer etc. are serviced by the company from which they have been purchased at regular intervals and whenever the need arises. From time to time the servicing of these equipments is undertaken and those in need of repair are overhauled while the unserviceable equipments are replaced. The college also uses the UGC grant.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The responsibility of location, upkeep, safety and maintenance of the sensitive equipment is entrusted to the lab technical staff, electrician, and gas man. For continuous water supply, the college has a deep bore well and an overhead tank whose maintenance is the responsibility of the PWD. Water coolers have been



installed at different places in the college premises. Voltage stabilizers, automatic circuit breakers, have been installed to take care of voltage fluctuations. There are three generators in the college maintaining a regular supply of electricity. They are regularly serviced. There are fire extinguishers in all labs, auditorium and the College Library.

Our institution enables the students to become economically self-sufficient by facilitating entrepreneurial skills among them by the way of the following initiatives:

- (1) In order to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students, the college started PGDCA, BCA and UGC sponsored, Add-on-Courses in Instrumentation, Industrial Chemistry, Data care Management and Spoken English. The Counselling and Placement Cell organizes lectures by eminent scholars to make the students aware of opportunities in the job market and for self employment.
- (2)Boutiques- Training for setting up boutiques is imparted by organising workshops in fabric painting, tie and dye, dress designing & stitching.



- (3) Candle/Flowers/Pot Making workshops organized by the HOME SCIENCE department help the students to generate income by selling these articles on festive occasions.
- (4) Students of Department of English are imparted training about Communication Skills which helps them in running classes after the completion of their studies.

Impact of these measures:

- 1. Many graduates are running their own boutiques.
- 2. Some of the graduates are running their own coaching institutes.
- 3. Some of our students are working as LIC agents.
- 4. Some of our Music Students give Stage Performances Like Gurbani Kirtan, Folk Performances, Ghazal concerts etc.
- 5. Students of Commerce are successfully running their own businesses.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as games, sports, quiz competitions, debates, discussions, cultural activities, etc.

For the holistic development of the students teaching is supplemented with active participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities. At the outset of the academic session, Talent Search contests are organized for the students to identify those who excel in various cultural activities. These students are encouraged to participate in the college/inter college activities and the Youth Festival.

An entrance test was organized for admission to MBA by Rayat and Bahra University at college campus. A student of B.Sc final student stood first in this test. Students from many colleges in and around participated in this test. Eight students passed the entrance exam conducted by AIRTEL at Chandigarh University, Landran. Six students were shortlisted for GD and one was shortlisted for the job.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students?

Since ours is primarily a multi-stream undergraduate college, students are not job ready immediately after graduation. However, various Add on Courses help the students in enhancing employment potential, communication skills and IT awareness. Following programmes were organized by the college:

• P-STEP (Punjab Skilled Training for Employment Potential) was initiated by the Punjab Govt. in collaboration with Infosys and training partners IndiaCan to develop communication skills of students during 2010-11. 80 students benefitted & qualified for the programme. In this cost free programme, IT communication and skill enhancement training was given to create a bridge between the academia and the industry



- Project Genesis was sponsored by Infosys, Punjab in which the company trained two members of the faculty, who in turn imparted training to the students. It was a cost free programme in which about 100 students were enrolled during the session.
- NAC-National Assessment and Competence test was conducted by Dept. of Higher Education, Punjab, Punjab Infotech and their partner NASSCOM, Bangalore. 309 students undertook the test which was conducted online NASSCOM promised job opportunities to successful candidates.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list the grievances reported (If any) and redressed during last four years?

The grievance redressal cell of our institution is monitored by the Principal and a committee which includes senior members of the faculty. The students are encouraged to discuss their problems with their teachers especially during the tutorial meets. They can also put their complaints in The Grievance Box placed outside the common room and in the library. The complaint box is opened on weekly basis to take stock of the problems. After discussion with the Principal, a speedy redressal is ensured. The nature of grievances brought to the notice of the committee during the last four years were: 1) Regarding drinking water 2) Electricity- fans, lights, etc. 3) Infra- Structure 4) Discipline problems 5) Mutual conflicts of students

Problems related to water, electricity and infra-structure are instantly taken care of by the principal and the concerned committee. Problems related to indiscipline are redressed by imposing fines. To ensure that there is perfect discipline; teachers are deputed on PROCTORIAL duty. In case of grave problems, the parents of the erring students are informed and the student is suspended for a week. Suspension and fine for defaulters acts as a deterrent for others.



5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The college has a grievance redressal cell for students, teachers, administrative staff and class IV employees. In case of any untoward incident, the cell comprising of the Principal, five council members and two committee members take immediate action to resolve the issue.

Anti ragging cell of the college is an active body that keeps a constant vigil to ensure that there is no incident of ragging in the college. Statutory warnings namely 'Ragging is a punishable offence and is strictly prohibited' are displayed at three strategic locations in the college. Every year, at the beginning of the session, the students are apprised of the negative aspects of ragging in the assemblies and the tutorial sessions. Other than the official anti- ragging committee, the staff members play a positive and constructive role in curbing this menace and till date there has been no instance of ragging reported in the college.

- vii) We help to infuse critical acumen among our students through guest lectures, seminars and field visits.



6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The College being a Govt. affiliated institution has to follow the policies of the State Govt. and the university in regard to admissions, reservations, system of examination etc. However, for the effective implementation of these policies and for quality enhancement, the College Principal, the College Council, IQAC and the entire faculty make intensive efforts. One of the most significant missions of the College being educational empowerment of large number of people, the College leadership has been making it possible to increase steadily the intake of students to various courses. The College has introduced new courses during the last 4 years keeping in view the imperative of providing education. These action plans are incorporated into the institutional strategic plans through various mechanism such as College Council & IQAC.

- The college leadership interacts with various stakeholders such as students, their parents, the OSA, representatives of the local industry and the College faculty through meetings with them. The meetings of the HEIS, PTA, IQAC, the College Council, and staff are held regularly.
- At meetings with various stakeholders the College leadership looks into the current needs of the students which are analyzed and action plans are formulated accordingly.
- The College seeks to pursue excellence in academic, sports and cultural/cocurricular fields. For this the College leadership through its meetings (formal and informal) with different stakeholders seeks to reinforce excellence by laying emphasis on disciplined work culture.
- The total number of permanent committees in the college is more than 30. However, these committees are reconstituted every year keeping in view the interests and aptitudes of faculty members. Several other committees are constituted as and when the need for implementing a certain plan is envisaged.



6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college adopts the following procedures for mentoring and evaluating the policies for effective implementation are as follows:

The College Principal ensures that academic leadership is provided to the faculty in the following ways:

• The College teachers are encouraged to participate in Workshops, Seminars, Conferences and Orientation / Refresher Courses.



• All departments are encouraged to invite scholars of eminence from other institutions / agencies and organize Extension / guest lectures.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The College makes all out efforts at grooming leadership at various levels. This is done both by encouraging participative management and sharing of responsibility at various levels. The democratic leadership of the Principal provides personal and intellectual support to faculty and students to attend training sessions and career development programs to keep themselves abreast of the latest trends.

- Teachers are empowered with wide range of experiences including extensive examination work. They are involved in setting up of question papers, curriculum designing, and also act as external examiners and supervisors for the University final examination.
- Students are motivated to participate in various academic, co-curricular and sports activities. Laudable achievements of our students in various arenas of knowledge are a witness to the efforts put in by the college.
- The efforts of the NCC, NSS and Youth Club are really praiseworthy in regard to grooming leadership potential of the students. The students are given the responsibility of managing and organizing events under the guidance of the teacher(s) in-charge.
- Various committees in the college, whose members all the college teachers are, provide an opportunity to the teachers for grooming their leadership skills.



6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Participative management constitutes the core of decentralized governance system being followed in the College. The Heads of the Departments, Conveners of various committees are fully authorized to take decisions while implementing their mandate or while preparing their programme schedules. The Heads of Departments, in consultation with other members of the department, are free to prepare the activity schedules of their departments and the ways to disseminate knowledge. Heads of Departments chalk out the time table, syllabus unitization, guest lectures, and other projects and plans to ensure quality of teaching learning in co-operation with other faculty members of the department.

Cumulative and comprehensive management approach empowers the participants, heightens their sense of duty and responsibility, thus catalyzing the success of the institution's working. The college has a well structured set up with various functional committees.

A proposal for Institutional Development Plan (IDP) has recently been submitted to DPI(C) under RUSA with inputs from different departments. We plan to upgrade our classrooms to smart class rooms, construct building for commerce department, new home science block, up gradation of office and construction of boys' toilets. The college makes relentless efforts to incorporate all the aspects as teaching,



learning, Research and Development, Community Services, Student Support Services and Infrastructure in Institutional Developmental Plan.

The college teaching faculty is encouraged to publish their research papers/articles and they are given duty leave to attend workshops/refresher courses/orientation courses/seminars/ conferences. The Institute plans to publish its own Research Journal in the near future.

Teaching & Learning

The learning experiences of the students are enriched by adopting innovative and interactive teaching methods and audio visual aids by various departments. Students' performance is closely monitored through class tests, assignments and house tests. Their progress is registered for improvement in teaching learning process. The college motivates its faculty to stay aware of the recent educational trends to prepare enlightened learners through seminars, workshops and trainings.

Research & Development

The college values relentless pursuit of excellence in imparting 'latest practical knowledge to substantiate the theoretical aspects. The college strives to provide the resources and other facilities as per the norms of State Govt. and DPI (Colleges) to uphold standards of scholarly excellence and professional development. Faculty members from different departments are actively involved in writing of



research papers. Eminent resource persons are invited for talks to provide exposure to students and develop a critical acumen in them. The Institute plans to publish its own Research Journal in the near future.

Community engagement

To make our students sensitive towards the cultural, economic and environmental realties, the college has 5 units of NSS, one army wing of NCC, Red Cross, Legal literacy club, Environment club and many other clubs involving interaction with various components of the community. Guest lecturers are organized to create awareness among students.

Human Resource Management

The College manages the human resources available with it in a way that maximizes the employee satisfaction and performance in the pursuit of the goals of the institution. Recruitment and retention of the permanent staff is in the hands of the State Government. The college recruits only guest/contractual faculty against sanctioned posts lying vacant, and for self-financing programmes. For this a very transparent system of selection is followed and the best available faculty is recruited. The workload to the staff members is allotted to them according to their specializations. This ensures that the college faculty contributes maximally in their areas of strength. The college makes the fullest use of the proficiency of the faculty in sports, extra-curricular fields by appointing such members on various committees as have a genuine interest in these activities. The teaching faculty is encouraged to participate in workshops/refresher and orientation courses/seminars/conferences organized by other institutions for value addition to their intellectual capital. The



departments which excel get praise from the Principal at staff meetings while others are encouraged to follow suit of their achiever counterparts. The faculty members are encouraged to enrich their competence through various development programmes.

Industry interaction

The college is entrepreneurial in its approach and strives to ensure skill development amongst its students. The students are provided a platform for interaction with corporate, banks, industries and other public sectors through their talks organized by various departments.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal holds regular meetings with the members of the College Committees and the College Council to review the progress of the ongoing projects and other activities. The feedback thus gathered is used to bring about further improvements. The implementation of polices and their outcomes is made available for other stakeholders through notices, assemblies, annual PTA meetings, Alumni Meet, college magazine and other electronic media like college website. All the activities undertaken by the college are compiled in the college Annual Report which is made available to all the stakeholders. Apart from this, whenever the affiliating university or the state government seeks any information about the ongoing activities and projects, it is promptly sent to them.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?



College follows a system of participative management. Academic and administrative policies are designed and implemented under the enlightened leadership of the Principal. Faculty members contribute equally at all levels to ensure smooth functioning of the institution. In the beginning of the new academic session, the College Principal addresses a meeting of the college faculty to orient them about the new programmes and projects to be undertaken by the College. Various committees for carrying out these programme/projects are formed with the entire teaching faculty on board. Periodic meetings are held to monitor the progress made in implementing the mandate of these committees. The needs, problems and suggestions for educational and infrastructural reforms are discussed in staff meetings with other faculty members.

Being a state-run college, the major policies are framed by state authorities and Department of Higher Education. At the college level, strategic plans are formulated by the Principal in close consultation with the College Council and IQAC. The projects and proposals are discussed and resolutions are adopted for prompt implementation.

Since ours is a Government College, every decision regarding the above is routed through the DPI (Colleges) and Higher Education Department, Punjab.

The college has a systematic mechanism to address the grievances of the faculty members and the staff. A Grievance Redressal Committee works for the prompt settlement of the students' grievances in consultation with the Principal and the College Council. A Grievance Box has been put up in the college outside the common room as well as in the library for students to submit their complaints in writing. The personal grievances of the students are dealt with in the tutorial classes where a teacher is allotted a fixed number of students (app. 50) to facilitate interaction and subsequent redressal of grievances.

Annual General Body Meeting of PTA serves as a platform for parents to share their grievances with the teachers which are recorded for review purposes. Parents are welcome to approach the college authorities or concerned lecturers regarding any problem faced by their wards.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The institution has a mechanism for analyzing students' feedback on institutional performance. Improvements sought by the students in the following areas have resulted in the college responding positively to the feedback. It has helped in providing latest infrastructure and improving teaching-learning strategies, installation of water coolers at different points, generators, renovation of washrooms and labs, computerization of library services, construction of girl's common room and introduction of new job oriented courses.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?



The college provides all encouragement to the faculty for their professional development. The college works on the principle of mentoring to promote the welfare of its faculty. They are motivated and extended full co-operation to update themselves with the emerging trends of interdisciplinary approach in the changing globalised world. The college the teaching faculty motivates to attend seminars/conferences/refresher/orientation courses organized by other universities and colleges. Whenever the college receives any information/invitation about the conduct of such programmes, this information/invitation is duly circulated to all the staff members. Duty leave is extended to them. Efforts are made to improve the research aptitude by motivating them to avail the schemes of UGC and DPI(Colleges) for their professional development. The research committee of the college encourages the staff to apply for Major/Minor projects of UGC, to go in for Ph.D.s etc.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college strives to upgrade the competence of the staff to cater to the global requirements. The incorporation of ICT in teaching-learning has become the need of the hour. Realizing the role of teacher as a facilitator, the college organizes short computer literacy programme for its faculty by the Dept. of Computers. Non teaching faculty was trained in the operation of the computers for salary management and other record keeping mechanisms.

The Appraisal System of the staff to evaluate their performance in various activities is in place. All the staff members have to fill a performa of self appraisal on the basis of which the college Principal writes the Annual Confidential Reports of the Staff.

The Performance Appraisal Report duly filled in by the faculty members is assessed by the Head of the Institution on the basis of their attitude and professional behaviour. It is graded as per the guidelines of the education department and sent to DPI (Colleges) for his kind perusal. Increments and promotions are based on the evaluative reports of **Annual Confidential Reports** (ACR's)

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Welfare schemes for the staff and faculty are as follows:

- Loan facility from the State Government (Refundable and Non-Refundable Loans out of GPF for various purposes).
- Wheat Loan facility for employees of Group D category.
- Fixed Medical Allowance @ Rs. 500/- pm to all regular faculty/staff members. Retired personnel also avail this facility.



- Medical Reimbursement Facility for employee and dependents for all indoor treatments and treatment of the chronic diseases. Retired personnel are also extended this benefit.
- Pension and all other retirement benefits such as Commutation, Leave Encashment, GIS, Superannuation. The benefit of Family Pension is also available.
- Casual leave, Medical leave (Full Pay/Half Pay), Earned leave, Ex-India leave and Maternity leave, Child care leave and leave for Academic Pursuits.
- LTC and Mobile allowance is also given to the employees by the government as per government policy at that time.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty

The recruitment, transfer and retirement of the permanent faculty is the prerogative of the department of Higher Education. The College, on its own recruits teachers out of PTA Funds/HEIS funds on as Guest Faculty. The recruitment process is made by a committee formed by the principal. The Guest Faculty are recruited on yearly basis. Those teachers who have performed well in the previous year are preferred to other applicants for the next session.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college has a well established mechanism to monitor the financial resources. PTA, HEIS and UGC Committee regulate the budget allocation for



different purposes under the guidance of the head of the institution. The conveners of various committees/teachers in-charge of various activities have to seek formal approval of the Principal for spending a specified sum of money in order to execute the work under their purview and for carrying out extension activities. The State Govt. rules concerning expenditure of funds are followed strictly. This involves calling quotations from the market, floating tenders or purchasing equipments/etc. on state govt. approved/DGS&D approved rates. The College Bursar monitors the entire process and helps the College Principal in effective and efficient use of financial resources. Records are duly maintained by the concerned authority/committee with invoices for further compliance.

Details about the internal and external audit are given below:

The college has in place an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The IQAC was established first in 2007 as one of the Post Accreditation initiatives for quality enhancement. Periodic academic testing of the students is done through monthly tests, mid-semester tests and house exams, seminars, organizing extension lectures by experts and organizing a large number of extra-curricular and sports activities are an evidence of how quality assurance has been institutionalized in the regular functioning of the college. The IQAC identifies strengths and weaknesses in the quality assurance procedures and to monitor the teaching and learning outcomes. It also works to evolve a feedback mechanism for further reforms and development, to promote research culture among the students and to explore new avenues to meet the global trends of the contemporary scenario.

The College principal is also the Chairperson of the IQAC. Hence all decisions of the IQAC are made with the consent of the Principal.

The College IQAC keeps getting feedback from the current students as well as the Alumni. These suggestions help the IQAC in formulating its agenda for its meetings.

The members of the IQAC are drawn from Sciences and Humanities representing different departments, and the College office is represented by the Bursar. All the members interact with other counterparts of the institute, take their feedback and discuss important decisions of the IQAC with them.

The IQAC functions in tandem with the College Council, Examination Branch, the College Office, the Library, Placement Cell and Career Guidance and Counselling Cell for an integrated approach towards quality assurance.

Since its inception, many staff members and college Principals have attended programmes on Quality Assurance organized by other institutions. The college conducts house exams, mid-semester exams and monthly tests and achievements of the college in academics, extra-curricular and sports fields are discussed at staff meetings. The students who make outstanding achievements in different fields are honoured at various functions and the Teachers-in-charge are also felicitated at staff meetings. Areas requiring improvements are identified and the



concerned teachers are exhorted to work harder for better results. This kind of informal academic auditing is a routine affair.

The college makes sincere efforts to align the internal quality assurance mechanisms with the broad parameters laid down by the NAAC. The college is also one of the Oldest Colleges (Pre-Independence) of the State. 7.1 Environment Consciousness



7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a green audit of its campus and facilities?

No formal Green Audit is done. However, the College keeps on improving the green cover in the campus by planting more trees. All developmental activity is guided by sincere concern for environment conservation. N.S.S. volunteers and N.C.C. cadets of this institution play an important role in maintaining existing plants and plant new saplings in and around campus during their camps and on the Vanmahotsava Day. We have a lush green campus with a variety of trees, plants and eye-soothing lawns. To make students aware of issues relating to ecology, slogans/inspiring quotes related to environment conservation/ecological balance have been displayed at different places in the campus. The college also boasts of a botanical garden.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The students are continuously sensitized towards healthy green environment in tutorial meetings. The members of the staff take special onus on themselves to keep the campus eco-friendly.

Energy Conservation

The staff and students ensure that the lights and fans are switched off while leaving the classrooms or laboratories, as it is the first and the most important step towards energy conservation.

• Use of incandescent bulbs has been discontinued strictly, CFL's and tubes are installed in all the classrooms, offices and laboratories.



- The wattage of lamps/tubes installed is as per the light requirement of the room.
- In labs the electric appliances and electronic gadgets are disconnected immediately after use.
- False ceilings have been constructed in computer science laboratories to reduce the power consumption.

Use of Renewable Energy

The college is planning to install solar lights on the college campus to tap the solar energy in near future.

Plantations

- To sustain the ecological balance a plantation drive is undertaken annually during 'Van Mahotsav'.
- 'Ozone day' is also observed to create awareness about the need to plant more trees and reduce pollution.
- The botanical garden houses different types of trees, shrubs, herbs, etc. The scientific as well as common names are displayed for their easy recognition. Majestic Pine, Cycas, Italian Cypress, Banyan, Neem Jatropha etc. are among the botanical garden flora.
- Spring is the season of fragrance and blossoms. The campus envelops a colourful look during this period of the year.
- Not only is environmental studies taught as an integral part of the curriculum but our scientifically designed Botanical Garden proves beyond doubt that our teaching is translated into a healthy eco-friendly practice.



Hazardous Waste Management

- •The young entrants of B.Sc. I year are given an orientation lecture by the Head of the Chemistry department on the safe use of chemicals. The students are cautioned against the careless handling of dangerous chemicals.
- •The teachers as well as the lab staff ensure that the students handle the chemicals carefully during the practicals. They are instructed to use the chemicals as per the requirement. Chemical wastes are carefully disposed under the supervision of lab attendants and teachers after minimizing their hazardous effects. The students are forbidden to throw the chemicals in the open carelessly.

E-Waste Management

The E-Waste is identified and stored separately. The disposal of this waste will be done as per the government guidelines.

7.2 Innovation

- Computerization of administrative has ensured easy and systematic maintenance and preparation of records.
- Police Personnel have been deputed at the entrance of the college to ensure the safety of the girls.

STRENGTH:

Economics has a bold approach to solve the multi-dimensional problems facing the nation. It is useful for eradication poverty, unemployment and overcome problems such as inflation, stagnation, recession, population explosionand adverse balance of payments etc. Knowledge is being used for accelerating growth in the world. Economics is a social science concerned with the uses and allocation of resources for achievement and maintenance of growth with stability.

Because economics impacts practically every activity of our lives either directly or indirectly. This is what makes it such an exciting area of study and a chaalenging profession. Moreover, economics is actually about real life issues-money, material goods and possessions.

Some of the students in the department are hardworking, keen to learn and most of them want to earn their livelihood with the help of "Economics". Most of them want to join post graduation in economics or MBA.



To help the students, department has collection of books and journals. Besides the available book facility from the college library, the economically weaker students are issued the books from the personal collection of the teachers. They are asked to return the books after the final exam.

Students are free to consult the teachers in the department after the regular classes. Moreover they are free to discuss their problems on mobile.

Besides December house examination, at least three class tests are conducted during the period. The names of the laborious students are recommended for award in the annual function and their names will be announced in the class so that others will also get inspiration.

Students are asked o present **seminars** in the class. They are motivated to prepare their topics with the help of books other than syllabus available in the library, articles published in the news-papers and journals etc.

WEAKNESESS:

Due to the vacant posts of lecturers in surrounding senior secondary schools, the number of students in economics are decreasing. Most of the students opted Punjabi medium at graduation level. While good books are available in English medium. Moreover one post of teacher in the department has been shifted. Due to this student teacher ratio has been increased.

OPPORTUNITIES:

Our institution is Govt. owned. The college can start M.A. classes. Self finacing course cannot be successfull due to poor economic backround of the students in the area.

CHALLENGES:

To start M.A. in the institute is a big challenge. Interested students, specificaly girl studets have to do postgraduation privately. To pursuade students to opt. economics is another challnge. At the Govt. as well as at the university level, hike in fees and funds is a chllenge due to which the number of students in the department is declining. To invite experts from universities and research institutes deliver their views on current economic topics is another challenge.

3. The Context

Keeping in the threats and challenges faced by women in the contemporary set up, a strong need to empower the girl child emerges as one of the major agenda of a 'women institution' especially if that institution like our own is catering to young girls from a socioeconomically deprived section of society and also girls from a rural background.

4. The Practice

Celebration of women empowerment week is an annual feature. The girls are apprised of the legal consequences of any kind of atrocity inflicted upon them. To tackle any such unforeseen events, the girls are given self defence training by martial arts experts. They are made aware about the information of help lines established by the government for women safety. Yoga sessions are arranged for their spiritual and physical well being of the young girls,



5. Evidence of Success

The concrete and the subtle results of the women empowerment week were enough to give various women welfare organizations a run for their money. Our vulnerable, hesitant girl students with a low self esteem were transformed into confident, self reliant professionals ready to take on life with a renewed enthusiasm and an insightful mindset. The empowered women alumni have made their mark in life and while experiencing the supreme feeling of pride and happiness for inspiring and empowering so many lives, we here cite a few examples. Ms. Tabasum is running her boutique in Ropar. Many of our girl students like Ms. Manjot Kaur, Ms. Inderpreet Kaur, Ms. Ravneet Kaur, Ms. Dinesh Kumari and Ms, Sandeep Kumari are serving in the college itself as lecturers.

6. Problems encountered and resources required

- Great difficulty in liberating the students from the fetters of a prejudiced upbringing, irrational thinking and the closed mindset of the parents.
- To shed their inhibitions, insecurities, to speak up and take a stand for their rights and against social inequalities.
